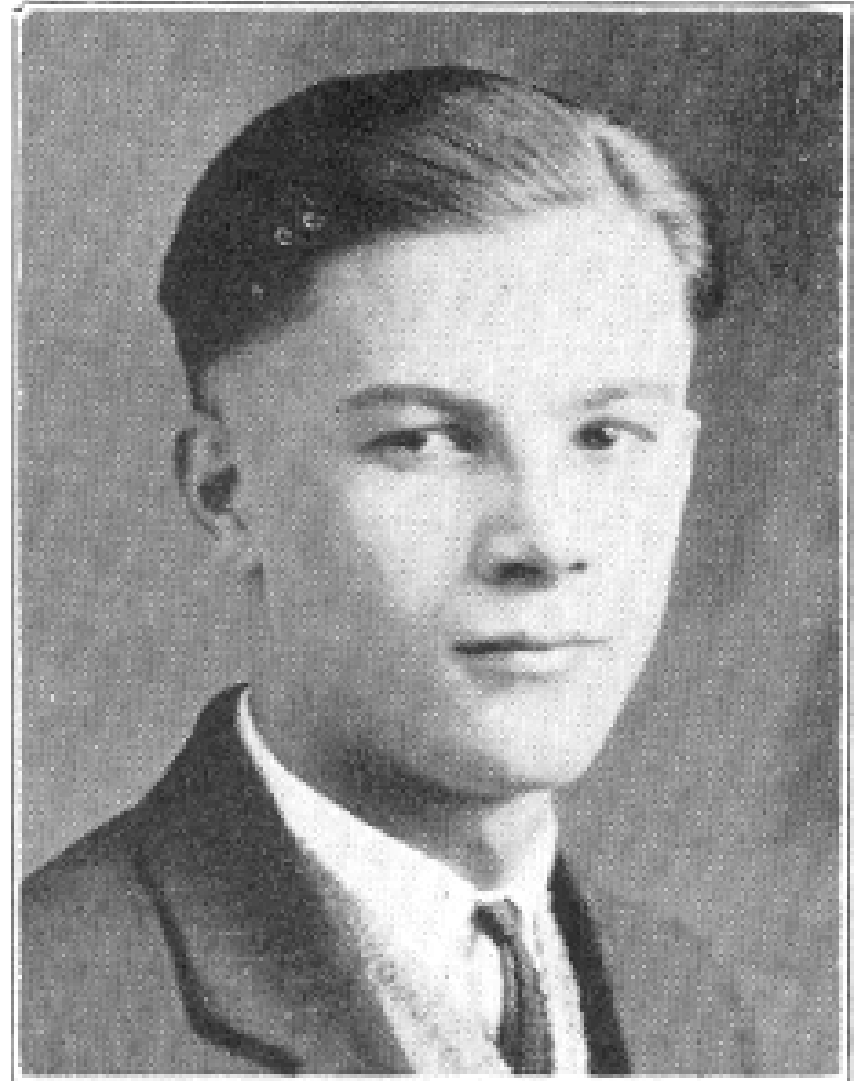
Mrs. Allen was predeceased by one son, Douglas, one brother and one sister.

ERTRUM M. HAMILL was born in Rome, Pennsylvania in 1878. He attended the village school at North Orwell for three years, then the school at Orwell Hill. He, with his parents, moved to Le Raysville where he attended school until he was through the seventh grade.

In 1893 the Mr. Hamill and his family moved into Oceana County, Michigan and Bert. Hamill resumed his education. In 1893 he began his High School career at Shelby graduating in 1899. He then taught District School for three years.

In 1902 he began his work at Ypsilanti. After his graduation in 1904, he became principal of the Woodland School, where he remained four years. One important event in his life in Woodland was his marriage in 1906.

In 1908 he accepted the position as Superintendent of schools at Pigeon, Michigan and remained there twelve years.

It was in 1920 that Mr. Hamill came to Corunna as Superintendent of schools. The improvement which has been affected in the school since his arrival is remarkable. The school spirit has grown immensely. When Mr. Hamill came to Corunna the spirit seemed to be, that the boy or girl who could get good marks with the least work and most bluffing was the most popular person. Also athletics figured in popularity but now the ones who are most respected are the best workers and the most upright of the students.

We think that the growth of scholarship is due to Mr. Hamill's studious nature and pleasing personality. He surely has been a guiding light to the students who have been under his supervision.

In 1923 he obtained his A. B. degree from Ypsilanti and has been working for his A. M. degree which he expects to get this summer.

During his life as a teacher he has attended summer school at Mt. Pleasant, Ypsilanti, M. A. C. and Ann Arbor.

The class of '25 extends its deepest appreciation to Mr. Hamill for his very kind and thoughtful guidance throughout these four years of High School life and he will always occupy a prominent place in the harbor of our memories.

RAY C. HOISINGTON was born in Shiawassee Town in 1885. He spent his boyhood on the farm attending the District school at his home town, and when he had successfully completed the eight years in this school he attended High School in Vernon, Michigan, graduating there in 1902. This school was not on the University List however and Mr. Hoisington, desirous of a college education attended the Corunna High School the following year, graduating in 1903.

In the fall of 1903 he entered the University of Michigan, specializing in Mechanical Engineering.

After two years of strenuous study he found himself unable to continue on account of his eyes, so for one year he taught in the Shiawassee Town School which he formerly attended.

The next fall he again attempted college life but was forced to stop after the first semester because of his eyes.

In hope of gaining his health he went to Montana for a year to do surveying work. This proved beneficial and in September, 1908, he began teaching in Clarion, Iowa where he remained for two years.

The following three years he taught Manual Training in Grand Rapids, Minnesota where he met Mrs. Hoisington. In 1913 they were married.

The next year was spent teaching at Fargo, North Dakota, where he had general supervision over the Manual Training work throughout the City.

From there he went to the North Dakota Agricultural College as supervisor of the Manual Training and Farm Mechanics Departments.

In 1917, Mr. Hoisington returned to his old home near Shiawassee Town where he hoped to regain his health. For five years he remained on the farm and in 1922 began teaching Mathematics and Manual Training in the Corunna High School.

He entered into our High School life, trying to make our work and fun as interesting as possible, always willing to help when necessary, and never afraid to show us our place when we became unruly.

And it is with our sincerest respect and appreciation we dedicate this book to Ray C. Hoisington, to the one who believes his success lies only in ours. And who, the three years we have been together, has tried his utmost to make our High School life a success.
