

He was a member of the Corunna VFW, the Fraternal Order of Police. He also served in the Pacific Theater in a field artillery unit in the U.S. Army during World War II.





The main event of our Freshman year, when we were guided by Mr. Stull, was our reception by the upper classmen. This we simul taneously disliked and enjoyed.


Likewise, the next year, led by Mrs. Woodward, our chief pleasure was a leading part in the gay initiation rendered the incoming class.


